



· Many before school and after school have run this year by ZW. the sports coach and NW the PE lead: football, BEAM, dodge ball, netball, archery, table tennis and multi sports. In addition, we had external coach clubs for basketball, dance, tennis. All clubs are fully inclusive and adjustments are made so that anyone can attend e.g. an additional adult is present to support children if necessary. BEAM is an invite only before school club specifically for pupils to develop their core strength and balance. 50% of the children who attended are on the SEN register. - Basketball nets for KS1 and 2 playground have been purchased and put in the playgrounds, new netball bibs have been purchased for team games, new equipment for the KS1 and 2 playground was bought. - We arranged coaching through

SSP for all year groups: cricket (year 4 and 5), tri golf (year 3), cheerleading (year 1 and 2) and tag rugby (year 6). 100% of children at Lady K were given the opportunity to take part in the coaching and festival at the end. -Through the SSP, most available events were accessed.
